The Council of College and Military Educators (CCME) is pleased to offer scholarships each year to service members working towards the completion of higher education degrees. All service members working on either their associate's, bachelor's or master's degree are eligible to apply. Each award is in the amount of \$500 and may be used for tuition, fees, books and other expenses encountered by the student pursuing educational goals.

ALL APPLICANTS MUST SUBMIT THE CCME SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION (found at www.ccmeonline.org), and an essay on the following topic: **What has your experience been like, pursuing a degree while serving in the military, and how will the \$500 scholarship be used to enable you to meet your educational goals?** Essays will be judged on written content and writing skills, and should be between two and three pages in length, typed, and double spaced.

APPLICATIONS MUST BE RECEIVED NO LATER THAN SEPTEMBER 30, 2005. Recipients will be announced at the annual CCME Symposium in February 2006 in Reno. All awarded and non-awarded applicants will be notified.
